#### The Minister writes:

After a bit of a break, work has continued on the site of the old church. The ground has been prepared for grass seeding and we are waiting for the grave stones that were moved for protection to be replaced. It is now possible to see more clearly what the state of the site will be when it is handed over ready for the next stage. I would very much like for the community to get involved with ideas and helping with the work.

One of the jobs to be done is to clear the path that leads down the steps to Aberford Road. I would like to invite anyone who would like to help to come on Saturday 18th October to help. Please bring your own tools if you can. We will start at 10am and if enough people come, it will not take too long. On the down side, it looks like some of the stones that have been left for building the legacy of the old church have been stolen. I would ask people to look out for this and report any suspicious activities to the police.

We are moving forward with the plans for building a suitable place for the war memorial and peace garden. These will be on display when we have our next consultation during the week beginning 17th November, in the Church Centre. On Friday 21st there will be people available to talk to and ask questions. We have had some great ideas so far. One of the graves that will be restored is of a local engineer called Bartholomew. His story is well known in Goole but is little known in his home town, Stanley. We would like to have something that tells his story. There may be other stories from the past to record and I would like to hear your ideas.

This is also the time of year when we celebrate harvest. We can stop and think about the good gifts that come from the earth, our gratitude to God and to those who work the land. We would like to invite you to join in these celebrations. There will be a Ceilidh on Saturday October 11th at St Peter's School, with the usual live band (please ring 835746 for tickets). There will be a special service on Sunday morning at 10am and on Tuesday October 14th a harvest lunch open to all in the village but especially aimed at the more mature members of the community to come and join us.



#### 'Come Ye Thankful People Come' - the story behind the hymn

Come, ye thankful people, come, Raise the song of harvest home! All are safely gathered in, Ere the winter storms begin; God, our maker, doth provide For our wants to be supplied; Come to God's own temple, come; Raise the song of harvest home!

We ourselves are God's own field, Fruit unto his praise to yield; Wheat and tares together sown, Unto joy or sorrow grown; First the blade and then the ear, Then the full corn shall appear: Grant, O harvest Lord, that we Wholesome grain and pure may be.... By H Alford (1810 – 71)



This well-loved harvest hymn was written by the Rev Henry Aldford, a Victorian clergyman who had been a student at Trinity College, Cambridge with Alfred Tennyson, and whose transparent goodness and friendliness seem to have made him liked and appreciated wherever he went.

His ministry began as vicar of Wymeswold, a tiny village in Leicestershire with a badly neglected church. Over 18 years, Henry rebuilt the faltering Christian community, faithfully visiting every person in his parish, and preaching his way through the Bible in sermons that were so clear that everyone could understand him. He then moved on to the incumbency of Quebec Chapel in London for four years, before moving to the Deanery of Canterbury, in 1857, where he lived until his death in early 1871.

Henry was one of life's good people: gentle, kindly, grateful for everything he had (he said 'grace' before AND after each meal), and eager to encourage all those whom he served. He was prodigiously productive: writing about 50 books. The best known was a four volume exposition of the New Testament, which took him nearly 20 years.

His famous hymn draws upon two of Jesus' parables: the story of the wheat and tares (Matthew 13:24-30) and the story of the seed that grows unbeknown to the sower (Mark 4:26-29). Both are parables from agriculture; and are about the harvest of our souls before God.

During this lifetime we give thanks to God for our harvest of his gifts of creation, but we should also reflect on what seed we are sowing in our lives, and what harvest we may expect; as one day God will gather together only his own for the eternal heavenly harvest.

#### Do we take the Bible for granted?

As approach Bible Sunday, on 26th October, we remember those who first translated the Bible into English. William Tyndale's translation of the Gospels into English was completed and printed in 1525, although this was in defiance of the law in England at that time. As a result, Tyndale was condemned and eventually burnt at the stake.

Myles Coverdale continued Tyndale's work and the whole Bible in English was printed in 1535. Eventually the English Bible became accessible to everyone who could read. It is a freedom we in Britain take for granted now. Though in parts of the world where Christians are persecuted minorities this freedom can still be denied.

Even in Uganda in 1972, a largely Christian country, a crisis arose. President Amin had recently expelled all Israeli citizens from Uganda because he suspected Israeli military advisors of subversive activity. Soon afterwards a Bible reading during Thought for Today on Radio Uganda, quoted from the Old Testament that the People of Israel were coming into their Promised Land. Amin saw this as a modern threat, and banned the name 'Israel' from being spoken in Uganda.

The Archbishop of Uganda, Erica Sabiti, confronted the President: "Your Excellency, if you forbid us to speak the name Israel, you are forbidding us to use this book. The name Israel is written in the Bible from beginning to end." "I forbid it!" commanded the President.

The Archbishop, frail and small in stature, held up a copy of the Bible to the towering President. "Your Excellency, down the centuries Christians have been willing to die to defend the right to read this book. We are ready again." The President backed down. Thought for Today, however, was banned.

All the children have settled well into their new classes and we are already busy with our new term. We are very excited to have our new classroom up and running and we have held parent information meetings to let everyone know about our new topics.

Year 5 have already had their Level 2 Bikeability training, and received some excellent feedback about their good attitude and behaviour. Year 4 have also received Level 1 Bikeability training. Class 3 had an excellent visit to Scarborough, when they looked at erosion along the cliffs and at the castle, as well as enjoying icecreams and playtime on the beach!

We are holding a couple of after-school clubs at the moment. Anya Greenop, a Russian artist, is running an art club, and we are also running a gardening, craft and bakery course. In addition, 20 pupils are rehearsing for the Young Voices concert at Sheffield arena in January.

#### Bibles removed from Travelodge

The nationwide hotel chain Travelodge has removed Bibles from all of its rooms, in a move criticised by the Church of England. Bibles provided free by the Gideons have been taken away to avoid 'discriminating' against any other religion, as Travelodge explains it.

The removals reportedly took place after refurbishment work across the hotel chain, which replaced the drawers where Bibles were being kept. In response, a spokesman for the Church of England said: "It seems both tragic and bizarre that hotels would remove the word of God for the sake of ergonomic design" or "economic incentive".

Writing on the Telegraph website, commentator Tim Stanley described Travelodge's decision as "an act of cultural vandalism upon a tradition that goes back 126 years".

In an official statement Travelodge said: "Travelodge made the decision to move copies of the Bible from its hotel rooms and place them at reception for customers to borrow in 2007. This decision was based on customer research and the fact that we live in a multicultural society. In order not to discriminate against any religion, customers who would like a Bible can get a copy from any of Travelodge's 500 hotel reception desks across the country, whilst staying at the hotel".

Travelodge is the only hotel chain in the country to have removed the Bibles, despite having never received a complaint from a guest. Both Premier Inn and InterContinental Hotels, who own the Holiday Inn chain, say that Bibles are being retained in their hotels.

#### On-going crisis for Christians in Iraq

This past summer a terrifying situation has arisen in northern Iraq, where hundreds of thousands of people have fled in fear of their lives, due to the advance of IS (Islamic State) forces. Many of them are persecuted religious minorities, including Christians and Yazidis. The UN Security Council has condemned these attacks as a brutal violation of people's rights to freedom of religion and belief, as set out under Article 18 of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights.

The 'Vicar of Baghdad', Canon Andrew White, has said that Christians in Iraq "face annihilation", and is urgently asking Christians in the UK to help through prayer and other support.

The Archbishop of York has called upon the Government to show leadership both internationally and domestically to support those suffering in Iraq. The Archbishop spoke following United Nations reports that 670 people were executed by ISIL in the city of Mosul, the worst recorded massacre committed by the Salafi-Jihadist group. "It is essential that Her Majesty's Government now take a lead both internationally and domestically to respond to the daily unfolding horrors in Iraq," he said.

"Holy Writ urges us to overcome evil with good and in circumstances such as those we are witnessing in Iraq, this means actively resisting evil both in terms of protecting the innocent and putting an end to the brutality of the perpetrators.

"The events in Iraq demonstrate a fundamental truth about humanity and its unbridled capacity for brutality. I have witnessed first -hand the horrors of brutality and its dehumanising impact upon perpetrators in addition to the untold suffering of victims. Unbridled violence brings untold suffering to victims but also dehumanises perpetrators to such an extent that murder becomes an act of the ordinary instead of a sin against the sanctity of human life. To adapt the words of King Lear: as flies are to wanton boys, so are the innocent to the dehumanised soul; killing them for their sport.

"The time for hard hitting speeches and condemnation has passed. What is required now is action to protect those at risk from slaughter. I invite all people to continue to pray for peace and our world leaders to become instruments of peace."




