The Minister writes:

Since the demolition of the old church we have been working to establish a long term place of worship in the village.

There has been recent change in the legal designation of the Church Centre. It is now a 'Parish Centre of Worship'. A Parish Centre of Worship is a church or other building licensed as such by the diocesan bishop in the Church of England, usually where there is no parish church. For most purposes it is deemed to be a parish church but it is dedicated, not consecrated, and parishioners have a right to be married in a neighbouring parish. There is also a licence to be married at St Peter's Church and Centre too. This means people living in Stanley have a choice about where they get married. So if you are thinking about getting married and are not sure of your options do get in touch.

The events we remember at Easter are, I would say, the most decisive events in human history. They contain the deepest tragedy and the greatest hope. As we enter into this story once again, we are given strength to face our own difficulties and confidence to embrace our times of joy.

Jesus was called to the home of his dear friend Lazarus who was on the point of death. But he does not set off straight away. By the time he arrives, Lazarus has died. His sisters Martha and Mary, both say, "If only you had been here". But Jesus transforms the situation; he claims to BE the resurrection and the life. Then he demonstrates it by raising Lazarus from the dead.

The implication of this does not sink in for the disciples—that Jesus has the power over death. So when Jesus was killed, his friends were

frightened and upset. This changed when Jesus was not resuscitated like Lazarus but resurrected. At this Easter may we know the transforming power of Christ, so we experience the hope of new life in whatever we face.

Easter Thoughts in a Churchyard—by David Winter

It's a yearly paradox. You bring flowers to the churchyard to lay on the grave of a loved one. All around you are graves and headstones, reminders of the inevitable end of life's earthly journey. But it's Easter Day, and from within the church you can hear the singing: 'Jesus Christ is risen today, Alleluia!' Perhaps then you notice a few other things. You're standing among the fresh daffodils and the grass that's green and growing again. For a moment you pause and reflect on the reverse of an old saying: 'In the midst of death we are in life'.


That essentially is what Easter is about - an annual reminder that death is not the end of the story. A few years ago I lived for a while in Cookham, in Berkshire, which was once the home of the great twentieth century painter, Stanley Spencer. Perhaps his most famous painting is 'Resurrection in Cookham Churchyard', which depicts local residents - many of them recognisable village characters - rising up out of their graves to be greeted by the risen Jesus, standing in the church porch. It's a glorious, vivid, shocking reminder of a great assertion. The graveyard is not a terminus, but a junction.



The resurrection of Jesus (and hence our resurrections, too) is the defining claim of Christianity. Christians don't follow the teaching of a prophet who died many centuries ago, or of a holy man whose life is an example to follow, excellent as that may be. They put their trust in a Saviour whom they believe is alive and with

them now, and they also believe that through Him they too will move through the junction of death to the journey that lies beyond - a journey he talked about to His followers.

I spoke of an annual paradox. It lies in the inescapable fact of death, indelibly represented by those graves and headstones, and in the equally inescapable fact that - in apparent defiance of all logic - human beings down the ages have clung to the belief that death is not the end. Every culture has its story of the life beyond - the Elysian fields, Valhalla, Nirvana, Abraham's bosom. But only with the coming of Jesus, and the witnessed events of that first Easter morning, has our instinctive belief been given wings. The paradox is the heart of everything. Death is a fact, but life is greater than death. 'Because I live', said Jesus, 'you will also live'.

ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING—a review

The AGM was held at 12pm on Sunday 22nd March. Copies of the 2014 annual report are available in the church, highlights of which are given below:

PCC Report: Discussions have been taking place about the future of the old church site, and draft plans have been drawn up by a land-scape architect. We also have plans for extending and improving the church centre building and have been liaising with the council to try and our 25 year lease. Issues further afield have included the appointment of the first woman bishop, the Rt Rev Libby Lane, and our links with other faiths. Our links with the local community continue to grow. We held a very successful 'Last night of the proms' and have set up a Senior Citizens lunch club. Thank you to everyone who supports our church financially which enables us to continue our work both here and in other parts of the world.

Treasurer's Report: Income was £23,957 higher in 2014 than the year before; this increase is attributable to higher regular giving, grants received, and Gift Aid money received back from the Inland Revenue. The coffee mornings, pantomime and galas continue to be well supported. Costs also increased, mostly because there was investment in new floor coverings, a new safe, and other fittings and equipment. However, the overall financial position improved by £10,330. Thanks to higher regular giving, we were able to pay our Parish Share in full, The Parish Share for 2015 has increased slightly to £45,917. We pray that we will be able to fulfil all our financial obligations as well as realising the many hopes we have for our church and community.

Church Wardens' report: Many groups use the church building on a regular basis throughout the year which is very encouraging. Our main challenge is to establish a new worship centre. Many thanks to the local councillors who have been outstanding in their support in requesting an extension to our lease, and our plans for this site, and for the site of the old church. We thank all those many individuals who contribute so much to the life of the church: to Bill and his team of spiritual leaders, and to everyone else who contributes.

Young People: The Explorers/Sunday Gang meets most Sunday mornings during the church services for crafts, games and Bible study.

All children are made to feel welcome, whether regular attendees or just visiting. Children's Ark meets on Thursday mornings from 9:30am for parents and tots, and includes singing, Bible stories, crafts and playtime. Many thanks to the leaders of these groups for their enthusiasm and dedication.

Uniformed Organisations: St Peter's continues to support the 1st Yorkshire Baden Powell Cubs and Scouts that meet on Tuesdays at the church, and the 39th Wakefield Brownies and the 3rd Cardigan Rainbows that both meet on Mondays next door at the Cross Keys centre.

Ladies Society: The Ladies Society enjoyed various speakers during the year and outings to Carr Gate garden centre, Holmfield House, and to the Thatched House in Stanley for Christmas lunch. New members are always welcome; meetings are on the 4th Wednesday of the month at 7pm at Stanley library.

Other groups: The 'Knit and Natter' group continues to grow and has over 20 members. The ladies do a variety of crafts and learn some new ones too, and have also contributed to the various church fayres. The Stanley Community Singers also continues to be well attended and held two very successful charity concerts during the year. The Film Club serves a wide community and shows an eclectic mix of films for all ages from modern to classic.

Social Events: Our pantomime, 'A Christmas Carol' was very successful and we sold about 500 tickets. Thank you to everyone who works so hard to organise the monthly coffee mornings, and the other fundraising events during the year. We also held a wine tasting night, murder mystery evening, Harvest lunch, Harvest ceilidh, 'Last night of the proms', pot-luck suppers, and numerous charity events.

Vicar's report: I am very grateful for the team that supports the ministry of the church: assistant minister, pastoral ministers, readers, baptism co-ordinator, church wardens and many others. We are very involved in St Peter's school and it is important to keep the school in our prayers. Informal weekly Bible study groups continue to meet, and we hold regular Taize, Holy Space and prayer services. Thank you to those who continue to make improvements to the building, and to the staff and volunteers who keep the café going. If we continue to work together, seeking the Lord's guidance and using the gifts he has given us, we have a challenging and exciting future ahead of us.

Largest volcanic eruption – ever

The largest volcanic eruption in history, Mount Tambora in Indonesia, began 200 years ago this month, on 5th April 1815. Ash in the atmosphere lowered global temperatures for two years, and an estimated minimum of 70,000 people died. The explosion was 10 times bigger than Krakatoa and more than 100 times bigger than Vesuvius or Mount St Helens. It was heard 1600 miles away, and ash fell at least 800 miles away.

The eruption column reached the stratosphere, an altitude of more than 27 miles. Fine ash particles stayed in the atmosphere for many months, spread around the globe by longitudinal winds, creating brilliantly coloured sunsets and twilights in London and influencing painters such as Turner.

In 1816, known as the Year Without a Summer, countries in the Northern Hemisphere suffered extreme weather conditions. Cool temperatures and heavy rains resulted in failed harvests in Britain and Ireland. Famine was prevalent in Wales and north and south-west Ireland, following the failure of wheat, oat and potato harvests.

Memories of Stanley

A reader, aged 93, shares some of his memories of growing up in Stanley and the surrounding area:

I have just been reading about the history of Stanley and the other villages in the area. I lived in Stanley for over seventy years but moved to Ossett 22 years ago. Here are a few of the things that I remember about my early years.

I started work as an apprentice and worked a 48 hour week which was spread over five and half days. My weekly wage was seven shillings and eleven pence (just short of forty new pence). In those days, a daily newspaper cost a half pence, and a Sunday newspaper cost one penny. You could send a postcard for a half pence, and a letter for one penny.


When my future wife and I started courting we used to go to the Clog and Rhubarb (the nickname for the Stanley Picture House). The stars we used to see in the films were Harold Lloyd, Charlie Chaplin, Laurel & Hardy, the Marx Brothers, the Three Stooges, Our Gang and many more. We used to have a good night out for an old sixpence (two and a half new pence): it cost one penny each into the picture house, then we called for fish and chips on the way home; one penny fish and one half pennyworth of chips each.

Violet and I were married at St Peter's church in Stanley in 1945 and celebrated our Diamond Wedding Anniversary in 2005.

My mother was born in Bread Baker Lane (now known as simply Baker Lane) in the railway cottages and she had six sisters; the eldest was born in 1871. She lived in the railway cottages for the first 23 years of her life, then got married and moved immediately across the road into a house in Armitage Terrace, where she lived for a further 70 years before she passed away at the age of 93.

My father was born in 1874 and was a jam boiler by trade. He was the foreman for Catlow Greenhalgh who had a jam factory on Canal Lane, which was later to become Tophams Woollen Mill. He used to tell me about boys as young as ten working down Stanley pit in the morning to pay to go to school in the afternoon.
