#### The Minister writes:

This year, from Lent through to the end of the summer term, we are looking at how as a church we might live with the priorities that Jesus taught.

In Lent we are looking at the story of John the Baptist, and after Easter looking at how we might become 'Jesus shaped people'. There is more about that on pages 14 and 15 of this magazine.

John the Baptist, like Jesus, had a miraculous birth. His parents, Zechariah and Elizabeth, were beyond child bearing age and had had no children. So when the angel Gabriel appeared to Zechariah and told him that his prayers had been heard and Elizabeth was going to have a baby, he did not believe it. However, true to God's word, Elizabeth did become pregnant and John was born. From the very beginning it was clear that John was going to be special and have an important job in preparing people to receive Jesus. He preached with power, so that people responded. He was not afraid to speak out against injustice or wrong doing, even though in the end it cost him his life.

John's story teaches us a lot about God and challenges us about how to live. We see God's faithfulness as John's birth was part of a long term plan and the fulfilment of promises made in the Old Testament. We see God's love and compassion; he chose Zechariah and Elizabeth who had longed for children, but had been disappointed. What joy they must have felt, when after giving up hope, they had their own child.

We are not all called to live John's lifestyle; living in the wilderness, eating locusts and honey and avoiding wine and strong drink. But we have the opportunity to be filled with the Holy Spirit as he was. This was part of John's message; that Jesus would baptise with the Holy Spirit and fire. Being filled with God's Spirit is what can give us wisdom, strength and direction. If we want to receive the Holy Spirit all we have to do is turn to Christ and ask. I would love to talk with anyone who wants to know more.

# **Jesus Shaped People**

On <u>Sunday 10th April</u>, St Peter's church in Stanley is going to launch a 15 week course entitled 'Jesus Shaped People'.

Jesus Shaped People looks at the life of Jesus in a fresh way. It asks 'What would happen to our church if we based everything we do on the life of Jesus?' It is a radical way to look at the Gospels, and will hopefully lead to a transformation of our church.

For this reason the core programme lasts for 15 weeks. By setting aside 15 weeks, we will allow ourselves the time and space to think in new ways about the teachings of Jesus.

And, of course, that means more than Sundays! At the heart of the programme are small groups, which as many people as possible will be encouraged to join, to meet with others to explore the themes each week. The small groups will be using detailed resources with bible study questions, interactive exercises, prayers, activities and much more.

Small groups are already meeting during Lent to discuss follow a special Lent course about John the Baptist, and the intention is that these groups will reconvene for the 15 weeks of the JSP programme. At present, these groups are meeting on:

- Tuesdays at 2pm at church
- Tuesdays at 6pm (location to be advised)
- Tuesdays at 7.30pm (to be advised)
- Thursdays at 7.30pm at the Vicarage

These days and times will be confirmed before the Jesus Shaped People programme begins and anyone is very welcome to come along to these small and friendly groups. Please contact the vicar or the church office for more information.

The Jesus Shaped People programme that we will be using on Sundays and in the small groups builds on five key themes from the life of Jesus with each theme taking up three weeks within the overall 15-week programme:

- **People:** Jesus wasn't a 'buildings person'. He was the original 'people person', someone who went out from religious institutions and met people where they were.
- **Teaching:** Jesus teaches people in a down-to-earth practical way. Using illustrations from real life, his teaching is challenging, but not condemning.
- **Team Building:** Right from the start Jesus was looking for a group of people with whom he could share his life and mission. And he gave quality to time to that group, building relationships and equipping them for what was to come.
- **Prayer:** Despite being mega-busy, Jesus made a priority of carving out time for prayer. And he spent time teaching and showing others how to pray
- **Prophetic Challenge:** Jesus often found himself in conflict with the authorities—particularly the religious ones! He never shirked that conflict, but responded with a powerful message.

Jesus Shaped People hasn't come from a classroom or a college, but from a parish church on a tough and disadvantaged estate in Bradford. Having been extensively tested in other parishes, and following a lengthy process of improvement and development, the programme has now been used successfully by many churches, including All Saints, Normanton.

This is not simply another course. St Peter's is embarking on Jesus Shaped People in order to bring about a transformation in how our church operates. In essence, it will encourage us to read the gospel and ask ourselves: "What would happen if we actually did all this stuff that Jesus talked about?"

As well as resources for Sunday worship and the small groups, there are also special activities for children and young people to fit in with the Jesus Shaped People programme. These will be used in the Sunday Gang meetings during every Sunday morning service.

Please join us as we embark on this deeply enriching process which we hope will bear much fruit in our church, community and relationships with one another.

# Women's World Day of Prayer

Friday 4th March, 7:30pm, Outwood Parish Church

On March 4th, women, men and children from 170 countries across the world will gather to celebrate Women's World Day of Prayer using a programme of worship that is offered this year by Christian women from Cuba. The theme of this year's service is: "Receive children. Receive me."

Cuba is the largest island in the Caribbean with a population of 11 million. It has had a chequered political history—it broke free from its Spanish rulers in 1898 and became a republic, but in 1950 a dictatorship took power which devastated Cuban society. This was swept aside in 1959 by a new communist movement, led by Fidel Castro and Ché Guevara. Diplomatic relations between Cuba and the USA have only recently been re-established.

Cuban women play an important role in society, family and the church with women making up a significant percentage of the workforce. After 1959, the communist government restricted the practise of

> all religions, but from 1990, religious freedom has been allowed and churches have again flourished.

> The WWDP service at Outwood Parish church is open

# The mighty Hindenberg

Eighty years ago this month the Germans launched the world's largest and most luxurious airship, the 'Hindenberg'. Although there were fixed wing planes already crossing the Atlantic and taking passengers, the public were fascinated by the massive dirigible, which provided space, comfort and even the freedom to move about during


slower but leisurely flights across borders and oceans.

Airships, or 'zeppelins' as the Germans called them, had been around for about 25 years. They were used by the Germans in the Great War as bombers – one was shot down over London.



The Hindenberg was spectacular and luxurious, and its maiden flight was reported world-wide. Was this how people in the future would cross continents, meals and drinks provided as they quietly glided through the sky? It might have been, but for the airship's tragic end the following June.

As the Hindenberg attempted to moor at the end of a flight in New Jersey, USA, with a full complement of passengers and crew, a fire broke out on board. Quickly the whole airship was engulfed in flames and 36 people were killed. The disaster was recorded by newsreel cameras and seen across the world. Shocked at what they had seen, people decided airships were not for them. The end of the mighty Hindenberg also marked the abrupt end of the airship era.



# Flushing away poverty

don't have somewhere safe, clean and

hygienic to go to the loo? That's more than a third of the world's population. So Teafund invented 'Toilet Twinning', a simple, quirky way to solve a serious problem and save lives. By 'twinning' your toilet, you help those in desperate poverty have access to a proper latrine, clean water and the information they need to be healthy.

Justine Kukundakute and her children in Uganda are one family that have benefited from toilet twinning. A local Toilet Twinning partner taught Justine the skills to build a simple loo for her family in Kabale district. They also taught her the importance of hygiene and hand washing. It has, quite literally, changed her life. The family's health has improved dramatically. Before they had a loo, the family suffered from intestinal worms and diarrhoea. Justine is now part of the local Community Development Team, who help others build their own latrines. So she can give the same life-changing gift to others.

Toilet Twinning provides people in the poorest communities with a decent toilet, clean water and all the information they need to stay healthy. It's the key to helping whole communities break free of the poverty trap. For just £60, you can twin your loo with a latrine halfway around the world, in a country of your choosing. For £240, you can twin with a school block. The donation is used by Tearfund to provide clean water, basic sanitation, and hygiene education. This in turn helps prevent the spread of disease meaning that children are healthier and able to go to school, and parents are well enough to work their land and grow enough food to feed their family.

Your smallest room will become the proud owner of a personalised certificate, complete with a colour photo of its twin and GPS coordinates so twinning.org you can look it up on Google Maps.

St Peter's church has recently twinned three of its toilets with latrines in Sierra Leone, Uganda and Guatemala and is now proudly displaying three certificates from Tearfund on the church noticeboard.


Family by family, community by community, nation by nation, we are helping to flush away poverty.

The Archbishop of York is continuing his Pilgrimage of Prayer, Witness and Blessing across the Diocese of York, which is due to finish in May 2016.

Archbishop Sentamu said, "My prayers have led me to this pilgrimage. St Paulinus, St Aidan, St Cuthbert and St Hilda of Whitby in their time shared the good news of Jesus Christ with the people of the North. Praying for those who come to know Christ is a great privilege and a joy. During this pilgrimage, I would

like to encourage everyone I meet to commit themselves afresh to try praying, be open to encountering Jesus Christ, pray for a mighty outpouring of the Holy Spirit, and receive the gift of the joy provided by Jesus Christ – and be thankful. Pray with me, and join me on the road!"

## Ten years of Twitter

Twitter, the online social networking service that enables users to send and read short 140-character messages called "tweets", was founded ten years ago this month. Launched in July that year, it is now reckoned to have over 500 million users.

It stemmed from members of the podcasting company Odeo. One of them, Jack Dorsey, said: "We came across the word 'twitter', and it was just perfect. The definition was 'a short burst of inconsequential information', and 'chirps from birds'. And that's exactly what the product was."

Registered users provide a profile and follow other users. There is a choice of who to follow and the facility to block someone from following you. It is also possible to post pictures and videos and links to websites, among other things. Although basically simple, it has many refinements, such as #hashtags, which enable users to follow a particular "trending" issue.

Twitter is free and is used widely for self-advertising. Hence Twitter is also used by churches to connect with their congregation and community. St Peter's in Stanley has been active on Twitter for some time and has the name '@stpeters'. If you follow St Peter's on Twitter you can keep up to date with all our latest news and information. There is certainly a strong argument that maybe congregations should consider using Twitter more. Many individual Christians already use it for inspiration or support from like-minded believers.

For those more deeply into the tweeting experience, tools like Tweetdeck enable you to keep track of different topics at once.

# 'Colouring-in' books

Did you enjoy colouring-in books when you were a child? Do you like them now? If so, you are not alone - as of a few months ago, the top 20% of Amazon's best-sellers were colouring books for adults!

Now Christian publishers have joined in on the latest craze. One Christian publishing house (Willow House Books) has released a Scripture colouring book with designs and texts, while another (Redemptorist Publications) even offers a Pope Francis colouring book, with designs supplementing his words.
