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The Minister writes:

Like most children, my favourite time of year was Christmas. I had lots of favourite times, but Christmas was that bit extra special. It was because we had an open coal fire blazing in the hearth making the house toasty warm. We had extra special food like turkey and Christmas pudding, and if I was lucky, I got more than two toys.

As I grew up my expectations changed but the thrill of Christmas didn't. Even as an adult I still find Christmas wonderful, not for me anymore but for my children and grandchildren. I can relive the thrill of my own Christmas experience through the faces of others.

For some, Christmas in a very difficult time. Personal circumstances, lack of money, bad relationships and a whole host of other things just can't help but get in the way. Sadly, for some, Christmas is the worst time of the year. Christmas is meant to be a time of giving. Today, that seems to mean spending lots on as many presents as you can afford even when they already have so much. As a Christian, I believe in giving, and giving for giving's sake, not because it is expected of me.

Jesus told us that we don't need a lot of money to make a difference to others, in fact we don't really need to spend a penny. All we need to do is give. We can give time, support, help and anything else that will, in the giving, help those who receive. It is amazing just how much



a few words of comfort can affect the hearer; a simple gesture of helping someone in and out of the house with shopping bags.

Jesus gave the greatest gift of all, a chance to live with him in his Father's house. To give us this, he gave his life. This gift is worth more than anything money can buy. I am not suggesting that you ignore friends and family at Christmas, in fact quite the opposite: be generous, but that doesn't need to be in the price and number of gifts. Just remember to be even more generous to those who are in need. We live in a society that is build on wealth, but it should be built on kindness and love, both of which we can give in abundance without cost. Have a wonderful and giving filled Christmas.



Remembrance Sunday

Remembrance Sunday this year was a very special event at St Peter's church, Stanley, culminating in the rededication of the war memorial on the old church site.

A lot of planning went on behind the scenes and sincere thanks must go to Barry McCarthy, the church PCC, and Councillors Jacqui Williams and Matthew Morley for their considerable efforts in making this happen.

The war memorial plaque was removed from the side of the old church nearly 5 years ago, before the demolition of the church. It had been in storage ever since, and particularly because of the significance of the 100 years since the end of WW1 this year, it was agreed to organise the cleaning and re-gilding of the plaque and the building of a new memorial.

The stone memorial has been crafted from stone from the old church, and on the opposite side, the clock face from the old church has been mounted. The clock face has also been cleaned and painted.

An appeal was launched to help pay for the re-gilding on the plaque, and around £450 was raised towards the total cost of approximately £1,200. Other costs associated with creating the stone memorial and transportation have been very generously covered by funding obtained by Councillors Jacqui Williams and Matthew Morley.

On Remembrance Sunday, there was the usual parade service at St Peter's church in the morning, and then an outdoor service at 2pm at the old church site. The afternoon service was led by Bishop Tony Robinson and Rev David Teece and included a couple of hymns and readings, as well as the rededication of the war memorial in memory of those from Stanley who died during both world wars.

Around 200 people came along to the service and it was wonderful that so many people recognised the importance of this memorial in our community's history. The service was followed by refreshments at St Peter's church.

Also as part of the 100 years since WW1 commemorations, over 80 poppy shaped boards were erected on lamp-posts in Stanley, each one bearing a name from the war memorial. The response to these poppy boards has been incredible, with many people from the local community finding it very moving to have these names displayed so prominently in our village.



St Peter's church was also very proud to display a beautiful poppy cascade which was made from hundreds of poppies crocheted by many people from the village, and put together by the church Knit & Natter group. In addition, knitted bunting featuring poppies and the



George Cross was created by the library craft group and was also on display in the church during Remembrance day, along with some beautiful flower arrangements.

Thank you to all those people who gave so much of their own time in many different ways to ensure that as a church and as a community we continue to remember those young men from our village who gave their lives so many years ago to protect our freedoms.

'The Star' (2018)

What is Christingle all about?

The word Christingle means the Christ-light, and the tradition of Christingle goes back to 1747, when the pastor of a church in Germany, John de Watteville, wanted to help his congregation understand about God's love for the world. He came up with the Christingle, which became popular within Germany before spreading to other countries. Nowadays, the Christingle is an orange with a red ribbon around it. Mounted in the orange are four cocktail sticks, each carrying some sweets. The orange represents the world, and the sweets remind us of all the wonderful gifts that God has given us in our beautiful World: He gave us these gifts because He loves us.

On top of the Christingle there is a candle which stands for Jesus: God sent Jesus into the world to light our way back to God. Finally, the red ribbon stands for the blood of Christ. He came into the world for a purpose: to die in order to take the pain and the sin of the world upon himself. This means that when we do something wrong and feel bad about it, we can go to God and know that we are forgiven.

Today, collections taken at Christingle services are given to the Children's Society to help its mission to change the lives of vulnerable children across the country who have no one to turn to. Whether they are a young carer, a refugee or at risk of sexual exploitation, there are thousands of children in the UK who need someone who is willing to listen to and support them.

By taking part in a Christingle service this season, you can help to change the lives of disadvantaged children and families in our local communities.

St Peter's Christingle service is at the earlier than usual time of 4pm on Sunday 13th January 2019 and will be led by Rev Jo Kershaw from St Anne's, Wrenthorpe

The Conversion of Ebenezer Scrooge

We think of the traditional British Christmas as a few days off work, a family get-together and a big meal. In fact, that only goes back to Victorian times. Before that it was a religious event, with church services and carols, but not a great community event. Among important influences on the change was a single story by Charles Dickens, 'A Christmas Carol', first published 175 years ago this December. It is in effect a morality fable, with a memorable anti-hero, Scrooge, and a splendid happy ending.

Ebenezer Scrooge ran his business with single-minded dedication to profit. His former partner, Marley, had died, and now in sole charge he decided to impose a more rigorous regime. There would be no Christmas Day off for his assistant Bob Cratchit, which ruled out the family's hopes of a celebration meal together. Bob's wife Martha was shocked, but Bob valued

his job and said nothing. Scrooge, who regarded all such fanciful stuff as 'humbug' remained immovable, despite pleas to the contrary.

That was, until Christmas Eve. That night he had a series of dream-like visions. The first was of his late partner, Marley, begging him to reconsider his attitude. There then followed three ghosts. The Ghost of Christmas Past' was a vision of his own unhappy childhood. Then came the 'Ghost of Christmas Present' about the disappointment and tears his decision had brought to the Cratchit family. The third was the most powerful – the 'Ghost of Christmas Future', in which he saw his own grave. Was this how he wanted to be remembered?

When he awoke on Christmas morning, Ebenezer Scrooge was a changed man. Bob need not work on Christmas day, and Scrooge himself would furnish a sumptuous meal for them all. The whole day was transformed, and Tiny Tim, the junior of the family, rounded off the whole experience with a cry of 'Merry Christmas, everybody.'

The story captured not only the public mood but also the public's heart. This was the sort of Christmas they wanted. And gradually it began to take shape – holidays for workers, charity for the poor,

warmth and love in the family. Eventually the law and the work of trade unions gave the new tradition a feeling of permanence, but there's no doubt Dickens' 'Christmas Carol' story started it all.

The first edition of 'A Christmas Carol' was first published on 19th December 1843 and had sold out by Christmas Eve! By the end of the next year, 13 further editions had been published, and in 1849 Dickens began public readings of the story, completing 127 before he died in 1870. The book has never been out of print.

Draw your margin

Saturday moweekend was no different as our daughter got busy with her writing work. The class teacher has taught them to draw a margin on each page before starting to write, but sometimes there has been 'huffing' from our youngest about why she should bother. This week, in the middle of her comprehension, she suddenly needed more space to get in something vital that she's missed. "Oh, that's what the margin is for!" she exclaimed.

Hearing her little conversation with herself, reminded me of a leadership meeting I'd sat in recently, where a seasoned and wise church leader was reminding others to build a margin into their lives. Building a margin into our life is about putting enough space between all of our commitments - and the very outer limit of ourselves and our resources. A healthy margin is about drawing and holding a line between the edge of where we live and work - and the actual edge - the edge that we don't suddenly want to find that we've gone over.

Intentionally building in enough margin is necessary so that we don't burn out or compromise the rest of our lives in the name of 'busyness'. But living with margin isn't only about us, it's also to ensure that those around us don't suffer when we live beyond our limits.

We can become pretty good at finding strategies that work, and enable us to maintain our margin and juggle the complexity and demands of life. But particularly in the weeks before Christmas, normal goes out of the window! There will be more demands and expectations placed on each of us. With the exceptionally pressured season of Christmas lurking around the corner, are YOU intentionally drawing enough margin in your life right now?

It can be tempting to budget to the outer limits of our time and energy, and just add in all the extra. But where life and work in this season require more commitments that you would normally take on, it's worth considering NOW where else you might do less.

A margin doesn't have to be a hard line. You can use it for something vital that you need to squeeze in if you really want to. But if that margin has already been drawn then at least when you cross into it, you're not teetering really close to the edge of your limits and resources.

Intentionally build and draw some margin into your life before you get too bogged down in pre-Christmas preparations. And as you do that, I pray that you have space to appreciate afresh the true heart of Advent and Christmas. Enjoy that space and rediscover the peace of Emmanuel - God with you - as you enter this season. Use some well-drawn margin to celebrate and rest - without crashing and burning.

CAP is worth millions to UK economy


Recent research by the London School of Economics has found the debt charity, Christians Against Poverty (CAP) contributes £32 million to the UK economy. It seems that for every pound the Christian debt charity spent, it benefitted the wider



society four times as much. The LSE also said CAP provides 'crucial' face-to-face support and goes far beyond simple debt advice.

Christians Against Poverty was founded by John Kirkby in Bradford in 1996. He believed God was calling him to sacrifice his career in finance and use his knowledge of the industry to help the poor. Over the past 22 years, CAP has negotiated with creditors, set up budgeting systems and offered a lifeline to those trapped in debt.

Nowadays, CAP runs 645 various projects with churches across the UK, including job clubs and debt advice. The local CAP debt centre is at St Helen's Church in Sandal. St Helen's also runs a Job Club and Fresh Start groups in Wakefield.

Peaceful Praise on a silent night

200 years ago this Christmas Eve a parish priest in Salzburg, Austria, and his organist wrote a new carol for the midnight mass. The priest, Fr Joseph Mohr, had written the words as a poem, and the organist, Franz Xavier Gruber, created a tune of haunting beauty. The simple words and wistful melody became one of the world's favourite carols, translated into hundreds of languages— 'Silent Night' as we know it. On Christmas Day in WW1, British troops heard German soldiers singing 'Stille Nacht' and responded with 'Silent Night'—the sacred words echoing across the blood-stained no man's land. This carol is about the infinite peace of the nativity: Mary pondering all that was happening and the shepherds returning to their fields. The birth of this royal baby went largely unnoticed. There were no crowds, no cheering, no processions. But for two centuries people have sung this precious song of peace to recall that silent and holy night.


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
