

The Minister writes:

You may have heard the news that we will soon be welcoming our new vicar to Stanley. The Rev Glenn Coggins has been appointed as vicar of Stanley, Outwood and Wrenthorpe and priest in charge of Alverthorpe. Rev Coggins is currently based in East Ardsley and will be licensed as lead vicar for our United Benefice at a service at St Paul's, Alverthorpe on Thursday 6th June.

Since Bill retired a year ago, St Peter's church has been in what is known as period of interregnum. Interregnum is the term used to describe the period before a new vicar is appointed to fill a vacancy. During an interregnum, the administration of the parish is the responsibility of the churchwardens.

Thankfully we have a fantastic team at St Peter's that we have been able to call on for help. Huge thanks go to Rev David Teece and our two readers Vicky Wilson and David Greenwood-Haigh, who have done a marvellous job of keeping the Church services going! As part of a United Benefice we have also been able to draw on help from Father Jonathan Bish from Outwood and Rev Jo Kershaw from Wrenthorpe, so thanks also to them.

During the interregnum the churchwardens are required to ensure the vicarage and any other property of the benefice is looked after. With the PCC we have been in regular discussion with the Diocese of Leeds (of which Wakefield is now part) about the sale of the vicarage. The building is not in a great state structurally and due to the high cost of repairs the Diocese has taken the decision to sell the property. We as a church do not get any proceeds from the sale but there is a commitment to buy another Vicarage in Stanley. As a PCC we feel that this is very important and will continue to push for this.

So as we continue through Lent to Easter this year it really feels like we are building up to a big celebration in the Church; celebrating the resurrection of Jesus on Easter Day and looking forward to the arrival of Glenn in June. We would love you to join us this Easter and you will find full details of our Easter services this magazine.

What's the point of Easter?

I remember vividly a simple poster I saw on the notice board of our local Methodist Chapel. It had a silhouette of three crosses on a hill, and underneath the words, 'FOR YOU'. Nothing fancy or clever, but a clear presentation of the Faster message, and it is



a clear presentation of the Easter message, and it struck me deeply: "What difference can the Resurrection make to my life?"

My past is forgiven: Have you ever been half-way through a project and wanted to start again? In life we all have regrets about things we have done, said or thought. The good news is that Jesus died to forgive these things: 'All sins forgiven, the slate wiped clean, that old arrest warrant cancelled and nailed to Christ's cross.' (Colossians 2:14, The Message). The resurrection is the guarantee that we can know Jesus' pardon and forgiveness. Do we need to let go a load of guilt and unforgiveness that we are carrying?

My present is under control: How often do we say "my life is out of control." We can't control life, but God can! The 'incomparably great power at work for those who believe' is the same power that raised Christ from the dead (Ephesians 1:20). God promises us the power that we need to face any situation, as we trust Him: 'I can do all this through Him who gives me strength.' (Philippians 4:13).

My future is secure: Death is the great certainty, 'one out of one dies!'. Yet Jesus overcame death by the resurrection, that we might experience the life of heaven, both now and for eternity. 'I am the resurrection and the life. The one who believes in Me will live, even though they die; and whoever lives by believing in Me will never die'. (John 11:25,26). We don't need to fear death; but if we are to really live, we have to be ready to die! How does the resurrection affect our view of death?

The death and resurrection of Jesus are events that are central to our faith, but sometimes we can over-complicate their meaning. The heart of it, though, remains very simple: Christ died for our sins according to the Scriptures, and on the third day was raised to life (1Corinthians 15:3). This Easter, why not think about these two simple words: FOR YOU.

Hopes & Dreams

The Lord's Prayer in music, dance and drama....

St Peter's Church will be staging three performances of the musical 'Hopes & Dreams' on Friday 5th July, Saturday 6th July and Sunday 7th July 2019. The musical was written by Paul Field in 1998 and was enormously successful at the time. It features 'The Millennium Prayer': the words of the Lord's Prayer set to the tune of Auld Lang Syne which was recorded by Cliff Richard and gave him a number one hit single.

St Peter's has staged the musical twice before; originally in November 2002 in Stanley Community Centre and again in April 2011 to celebrate 10 years since our move from the old church to our new building. Even more than 20 years after it was written, the music is still so powerful that we felt it was time to revisit it, and stage it again for a new audience.



The whole musical is based on the Lord's Prayer, and uses the themes of creation, forgiveness, temptation among others as the inspiration for the songs, poems, dances and drama. We have a brilliant team of people busy rehearing for the performances in the summer. Details of ticket sales will be released nearer the time.

Why we are turning to soap bars: It's official: we are buying more soap bars these days, according to data compiled by Kantar Worldpanel. And that is a good thing. It is all a part of the major consumer backlash against unnecessary plastic waste. More and more of us want eco-friendly versions of our everyday needs. Thus, we have 'bags for life', loose fruit and veg, and now – bars of soap.

Liquid soaps took off in the 1990s and was marketed as more hygienic than barred soap. But since then, numerous scientific studies have found this to be myth. And in the meantime, hundreds of millions of plastic bottles full of soap have been used once — and thrown into the environment.

Whereas with a bar of soap, once it is gone, it really is gone, with no bottle to throw away!

The extraordinary success of Robinson Crusoe

It was 300 years ago, on 25th April 1719, that Daniel Defoe's novel Robinson Crusoe was first published. The book is believed to be second only to the Bible in the number of translations made.

The author was born Daniel Foe in London in 1860 and added the De to his name when he was 40. His father was a butcher and a Presbyterian, and he himself had thoughts at one time of becoming a Presbyterian minister.

He had various business and commercial interests and was declared bankrupt more than once. He was also a journalist and pamphleteer, and in 1703 he was jailed for publishing 'The Shortest Way with the



Dissenters' – a rather unsuccessful satire seen as a 'seditious libel' – but was released after five months and became a government agent.

He turned to fiction and published "The Life and Strange Surprizing Adventures of Robinson Crusoe" at the age of 59.

Presented as an autobiography by Mr Crusoe, the book was at first thought to be true but was later believed to be based on the experiences of Scottish castaway Alexander Selkirk, who lived for four years on a Pacific island 400 miles west of Chile. Now renamed Robinson Crusoe Island, it bears little resemblance to the island in Defoe's novel.

Happy Birthday, Manchester City!

Manchester City Football Club, top of the pile in the Premier League last season and now in the running for more honours, was founded 125 years ago, on 16th April 1894 – as a reorganised church team.



The original church team was established in 1880, initially by two churchwardens at St Mark's (West Gorton), as an attempt to benefit the community by curbing local gang violence, 'loutish behaviour' and alcoholism at a time of high unemployment in East Manchester.

Gorton AFC, as it became, won only one game in its first season, but from 1887, after a new piece of ground on Hyde Road was found for a pitch, it became Ardwick AFC, and in 1894 Manchester City. During the early years its main competitor was nearby Newton Heath, which became Manchester United.

United's ground, Old Trafford, is now west of the city centre. But both Gorton and Ardwick are within a couple of miles of the Etihad, Manchester City's stadium, and so their link is still close.

Ardwick was elected to the new Second Division when two-tier football came to England in 1892; because the Premier League started in 1992, Ardwick/MCFC were in the Football League for exactly 100 years.

Where did the Easter Bunny and Easter eggs come from?

The Easter bunny is a gentle figure of folklore, who seems to have first come from the German Lutherans. They depicted him as a rabbit who brought coloured Easter eggs to children. It was first written about by Georg Franck von Franckenau in 1682.

The idea of an egg-giving hare went over to the US in the 18th century, when Protestant German immigrants in the Pennsylvania Dutch area told their children about the 'Osterhase'. Hase means hare, and according to the legend, only good children found the hare's gifts of coloured eggs, candy, and sometimes toys, placed in the nests that they had made in their caps and bonnets before Easter.

The hare was a popular motif in medieval church art, and eggs, rabbits and hares were all ancient symbols of fertility, procreation and new life; birds lay eggs in large numbers in the spring, and rabbits can have several large litters each year. Easter eggs are also said to represent Jesus' emergence from the tomb and resurrection.

Decorating Easter eggs dates back to at least the 13th century. One possible reason for the custom was that in those days eggs were forbidden during the Lenten season. So people would paint and decorate them to mark the end of the period of penance and fasting, and then eat them on Easter as a celebration.


<u>The largest ever Easter egg hunt</u> was in April 2012 when 12,773 entrants took part in the Fabergé Big Egg Hunt.

The largest-ever decorated Easter egg was built in March 2008, by Freeport in Alcochete, Portugal. It measured 14.79 m (48 ft 6 in) long and 8.40 m (27 ft 6 in) in diameter.

The largest ever chocolate Easter egg was made in Tosca (Italy) and weighed 7,200 kg (15,873 lbs 4.48 oz). It had a circumference of 19.6 m (64 ft 3.65 in) at its widest point. It was exhibited in a shopping centre in Cortenuova, Italy, in April 2011.

The most expensive hot cross bun was baked in 1829 in Stepney, London. It was bought by Bill Foster (UK) for £155 at the Antiques for Everyone show at the NEC in Birmingham, West Midlands, UK, in April 2000. Hot cross buns were originally made to hang in the kitchen to ward off evil spirits.

The biggest-ever (real) Easter bunny was Darius, a Flemish giant rabbit owned by Annette Edwards (UK), who was found to be 4 ft 3 in (129 cm) long when measured for an article in the UK's Daily Mail newspaper in April 2010.

Waste not, want not: Root-to-flower eating is the latest craze in many British restaurants, as more and more waste-conscious chefs aim to use the whole plant instead of throwing away the leaves. So now you can enjoy carrot tops, beetroot stems, cauliflower leaves and cucumber flowers. As one chef says: "Most plants are all edible. But what we usually do is take the middle of it and waste the rest."

However, before you eat any new part of a familiar plant, MAKE SURE IT IS NOT TOXIC. For example, the wrong parts of apple, almond, asparagus, elderberry, plum, potato and rhubarb can land you in hospital. So—if in doubt, throw it out.

How to live longer: If your diet is full of fibre, you may cut the risk of early death by up to a third. Fibre is found in fruit, vegetables, wholemeal bread and pasta, as well as high-fibre breakfast cereals. Overall, people who eat such things tend to have lower body weight and lower cholesterol levels, which in turn reduce their chance of heart disease, cancer, stroke, and Type 2 diabetes by up to 24 per cent.


