### The Minister writes:

Dear Friends,

You do not need me to tell you that Brexit has dominated our political life as a nation for well over three years now. Looking back to when the referendum took place in June 2016 there was a real sense that things would be done and dusted in a comparatively short time. How wrong that has turned out and as time has passed and deadlines have come and gone the rhetoric and debates and language surrounding Brexit has taken a turn for the worse. However and whenever the country leaves the European Union, we will be faced with serious challenges to what it now means to be British together. There are many different political views on political priorities and actions. The key is how we agree to disagree and move forward as a nation loving one another and working for unity.

# Asia Bibi and the growing intolerance towards religion

Asia Bibi, the Christian woman who spent eight years on death row in Pakistan on charges of blasphemy, has called for reform of the blasphemy laws.

Giving an interview in Canada, for the first time since her release from prison last year, Bibi told the Sunday

Telegraph: "I pray to God that everyone falsely implicated in blasphemy cases should be released, that they get freedom and God helps them. "There should be proper investigation mechanisms while applying this law. We should not consider anyone sinful for this act without any proof", she added.

Bibi also spoke about her time in a Pakistani jail. She said that her Christian faith had never faltered, and that when her daughters had visited her, she had never let them see her suffering. "I used to cry alone, filled with pain and grief," she added. Bibi and her family are currently living in Canada, but may move to Europe shortly.

Sadly, intolerance of religion is on the increase across the globe. According to the Annual Pew Report, Christians and followers of other religions face harassment in 143 countries, with governments around the world imposing stricter restrictions on religion, and violence and harassment against religious groups on the rise.

Moreover, the Bishop of Truro's Review for the Foreign & Commonwealth Office (FCO) found that Christians are the most persecuted religious group in the world today. It reports that 'religious restrictions have been rising around the world for the past decade'.

Release International, which supports persecuted Christians, welcomes the Pew Report, but adds that it omits North Korea, and doesn't focus enough on the intensifying persecution in China.

In recent years, the Chinese government has ramped up efforts to arrest and deport Christian missionaries. It has restricted the number of religious groups who can register with the government to hold worship services. There are even reports of registered Christian churches being shut down by the government.

Religious restrictions and violence are also spreading to Europe, and the report cites the case in Glasgow in 2016 when a Sunni Muslim man killed an Ahmadi Muslim shopkeeper because he said he had 'disrespected the Prophet Mohammed'.

Religious terrorism is growing in Europe and the Middle East and North Africa. According to the Report: 'The Middle East and North Africa has seen the highest levels of religious violence by organised groups.' Organised groups spreading religious violence include Isis, Al Qaeda, the Taliban, Hamas and Boko Haram.

Egypt, India, Russia, Pakistan and Indonesia are the most populous countries with the highest restrictions on religion. Sub-Saharan Africa is another region to have experienced 'a sharp rise in government laws and policies restricting religious freedom'. The report singles out Nigeria as a country with one of the largest increases in religious violence by organised groups since 2007.

In Central Asia, Turkmenistan continues to deny visas to foreigners suspected of missionary work. Turkmenistan, Uzbekistan and Kazakhstan have all imposed restrictions on Christian literature. And in the Asia-Pacific region, according to the Report, 86 per cent of countries' governments were found to be intimidating religious groups in the region.

### The Bible Society—helping Christians in Algeria

The Bible Society works in over 200 countries around the world, on a global mission to bring the Bible to life for every person. The charity is hard at work in Algeria, even though some of its staff could be arrested and imprisoned at any time. But they are willing to take the risk, in order to support the besieged church there, which is begging for as many as 50 Bibles every week. As a Bible Society spokesman explains: "Our office remains the only place in Algeria where you can be sure to get a Bible." The Church in Algeria lives under pressure and suspicion, in a country rocked by political instability. But when church buildings are forced to close, the Christians simply put up tents and meet there instead.

### In praise of grandparents!

6th October is 'Grandparents Day'. Grandparents in the UK number about 17 million, or more than one in four of the adult population. Grandparents are on average 68 years of age, have four grand-children who live 10 miles away, and who spend five hours per visit.

Grandparents have multiple roles as their grandchildren grow up: playmates, teachers, confidants, spiritual guides, mentors, role models and nurturers, as well as pray-ers. They also can keep children's milestones, family history and family events alive. Grandchildren will often discuss their personal concerns with a trusted grandparent.

Grandparents are also important for the UK economy! Nine million of them looked after their grandchildren in 2017. On average they did so for eight hours a week, and 96% received no payment.

Research has found that about 10% of grandparents are churchgoers, and of those grandparents, 60% of their grandchildren are also likely to go to church. Grand-parental example is followed!

Moses' appeared to make a comment on grandparents in his plea to the Israelites "not to forget the things your eyes have seen ... make them known to your children and children's children" (Deuteronomy 4:9). And how about Psalm 92:14—"They will still bear fruit in old age; they will stay green and strong."

### Nietzche—the man who said 'God is dead'

The German philosopher Friedrich Nietzsche was born 175 years ago, on 15th October 1844, near Leipzig. His father was a Lutheran minister. He is perhaps known best for his paradoxical statement that "God is dead", and his suggestion that traditional Christian beliefs and morality were "unbelievable". One of his arguments being that the "brimstone, hellfire, and damnation diatribe" in Christian sermons was incompatible with a religion of love and forgiveness.

His novel 'Thus Spoke Zarathustra' was used by Richard Strauss to create a tone poem of the same name, the fanfare of which was employed to stunning effect in the 1968 film 2001: A Space Odyssey.

Nietzsche's health was poor. He developed dementia and became totally silent, dying of a stroke in 1900.

### Birds in the Bible

There are up to 10,000 different kinds of birds in the world, and with about 530 different kinds in Israel alone, no wonder birds get a frequent mention in the Bible.

Noah released a dove from the ark to look for dry ground. A stork, an ostrich and an eagle are mentioned in Job. Quails were food for the Israelites in the desert. Elijah was fed by ravens. Proverbs refers to sparrows chirping on rooftops. Peter denied Jesus before the cock crowed.

A dove descending is a symbol of the Holy Spirit. The flight of the eagle reminds us of freedom and the renewal of strength. The psalmist uses wings as a symbol for the protection of God in times of trouble. Isaiah likens a bird hovering over its nest to protect its young, to God's protection of Jerusalem. Jesus yearned to gather the people of Jerusalem to Him as a hen gathers her chicks under her wings.

Jesus also compared us with sparrows: "For only a penny you can buy two sparrows, yet not one sparrow falls to the ground without your Father's consent...so do not be afraid; you are worth much more than many sparrows!" (Matthew 10:29-30)



For Jesus encourages us to know that each one of us is significant to God. He knows us personally, and, in His sight, we are precious and of great value. Let's raise our eyes heavenward and when we see all the birds migrating this autumn, let's give thanks to God. Like them, we can be confident, for we are always in His loving care.



### All in the month of October

- 150 years ago, on 2nd Oct 1869: Mahatma Gandhi, Indian activist, was born. He led the Indian independence movement against British rule.
- 150 years ago, on 16th Oct 1869: Girton College (Cambridge) was established as one of the first residential colleges for women.
- 100 years ago, on 7th Oct 1919: the Dutch airline KLM was established. It is the world's oldest airline.
- 90 years ago, on 29th Oct 1929: the Wall Street Crash took place, leading to the Great Depression in the USA
- 80 years ago, on 16th Oct 1939: the German Luftwaffe carried out its first attack on British territory, bombing ships in the Firth of Forth, Scotland.
- 75 years ago, on 30th Oct 1944: Jewish diarist Anne Frank and her sister Margo were transported from Auschwitz concentration camp to Bergen-Belsen. They died there, probably from typhus, in early 1945.
- 60 years ago, on 7th Oct 1959: the Soviet space probe Luna 3 sent back the first images of the far side of the Moon.
- 25 years ago, on 13th Oct 1994: the three main loyalist paramilitary groups in Northern Ireland announced a ceasefire.
