

The Minister writes:

Dear Friends, As I was preparing for the season of Lent I came upon a 'Charlie Brown' cartoon which has little Linus, looking very forlorn, asking Lucy, 'Why are you always so anxious to criticize me?' Lucy looking very self-righteous replies: 'I just think I have the knack for seeing other people's faults'. Linus turns indignant; 'What about your own faults?



faults'. Linus turns indignant; 'What about your own faults?' he asks. 'I have a knack for overlooking them' answers Lucy.

Well, we have now entered the forty days of Lent and by church tradition we are challenged to spend the period in self-examination and self-denial. The aim being that the forty days are sufficiently long enough to help us change all but the most deeply rooted habits. It is like spiritual aerobics where the Christian tones up on their spiritual life.

Lent can be thought of in negative terms if it is about 'giving things up' and no doubt there will be aspects of our lives which need close inspection. Time spent with God and reflecting on our lives are always rich and fruitful. Lent is a time to hear and believe that God loves us, and then spend at least forty days attempting to find out what that means. Jesus was sent into the desert to face his temptations straight after his baptism in the river Jordan. It was just after being baptized by John that a voice was heard from God that said to Jesus 'you are my Son, with whom I am well pleased'. For Jesus he knew he was truly the Son of God and loved by his Father. When Jesus heard God's words, he set out to a place of quiet and solitude, the desert, so that he could think and pray about them.

At the heart of the Christian story is the belief that God made the world and everything in it out of love. Jesus came to live and die for us so that we can understand God's words to him as being meant for us too 'You are my beloved daughters and sons; you give me pleasure'.

Going into the desert isn't an option for most of us, but perhaps we can make a little time during Lent to try think about what our lives are for. And that might mean giving up, at least for a bit, some of the things that distract us, so that we can focus better on the essentials of what life is all about and our place in God's marvellous world.

May your Lent devotions help you experience God's love for you in a deeper and more profound way.



Stanley now linked with Alverthorpe

St Peter's church in Stanley is now officially linked with St Paul's, Alverthorpe in the 'United Benefice of North Wakefield'. This came into effect on 1st February 2020 and is simply an extension of the existing arrangement that has existed for a few years between St Peter's in Stanley, St Mary Magdalene in Outwood and St Anne's in Wrenthorpe.

Rev Glenn Coggins is the Priest in Charge of the United Benefice and has direct responsibility for St Peter's. Although Glenn lives in the vicarage at Alverthorpe, he spends a couple of days a week based in the office at St Peter's church and leads many our services, including Sunday mornings, baptisms, funerals, and special evening services. He also delivers weekly assemblies at St Peter's school.

The vicar for Outwood is Father Jonathan Bish, and the vicar for Wrenthorpe is Rev Jo Kershaw. Jonathan and Jo are married, and live in the vicarage at Wrenthorpe. The clergy team are assisted by two other vicars, one part-time and one retired, and also a number of Lay Readers. We are very fortunate to have a such a large and experienced ministry team serving the four churches, and all members of the team rotate between each of the churches so that they get to know everyone and share their different gifts and perspectives.

So, now that St Peter's is linked with three other churches in north Wakefield, the challenge is to continue to find ways of working together and sharing ideas and best practise, with each church retaining their own style and independence.

The four churches are already doing lots together, including joint social events, evening services and outings. In future, there may be joint confirmation courses, children's activities and family services. But each church will continue to hold its own Sunday services and retain its own identity and independence.



Mothering Sunday—22nd March

There is an old Jewish saying: "God could not be everywhere and therefore He made mothers." Mother Church, Mother Earth, and our own mothers have all been celebrated as part of 'Mothering Sunday' in the

UK since at least the 1600's.

In most countries, Mother's Day is a secular festival celebrated on the 2nd Sunday in May. In the UK it is celebrated on the 4th Sunday of Lent, on the Christian day of Mothering Sunday. Join us at St Peter's on 22nd March at 10am for our popular Mothering Sunday family parade service. This will be a family friendly non-communion service.

200 years of astronomy

The Royal Astronomical Society was founded 200 years ago, on 10th March 1820. Originally called the Astronomical Society of London, it had been opposed by Sir Joseph Banks, president of the Royal Society, who persuaded the Duke of Somerset to withdraw his agreement to be the first president. But it survived with William Herschel as president, though he never actually took the chair at a meeting.

The idea was simply to promote astronomy. At the outset there were very few professional astronomers, but this soon changed. A Royal Charter was signed by William IV in 1831, and the name of the Society was altered. Since then every monarch has been a patron.

The Society was closed to women at first, and women were not admitted to fellowship until 1916, although Caroline Herschel was awarded a gold medal as early as 1828 and elected an honorary member, with Mary Somerville, in 1835.



Currently the Society, with more than 4,000 members, has three main functions: maintaining a library, organising scientific meetings – geophysics is now part of its remit – and publishing journals.

A prominent 21st century fellow is Professor David Wilkinson, a theoretical astrophysicist and lecturer in theology, who is working on the dialogue between science and religion.

The man who invented self-raising flour

Henry Jones, a baker from Bristol, was granted a patent for his invention of self-raising flour 175 years ago, on 17th March 1845.

Jones was born in Monmouth, Wales, but he established a bakery in Broadmead, Bristol. His formula for making self-raising flour—essentially a process of baking without yeast—was granted a patent in 1845, and by the end of 1846 it was a runaway success, and he was soon supplying patent flour and biscuits to Queen Victoria.

He was granted a patent in the USA in 1849, and in 1852 the first gold medal for the new flour was issued to a Chicago firm using the Bristol formula, but his greatest opponent was the British Admiralty. Jones pointed out in detail and at length the benefits to seamen of using the new flour instead of the hard biscuits they were used to, and he received a great deal of support from individual captains and many prominent people.



But it was not until 1855, when his flour was used in the Crimean War—partly at the request of Florence Nightingale—and was so effective in saving lives and improving food supplies, that it got the grudging acceptance of the Admiralty.

Gandhi's salt march against the British

It was 90 years ago, on 12th March 1930, that Indian political and spiritual leader Mahatma Gandhi led 78 activists and followers on a 23-day "salt march" to protest against a British tax on salt and a ban on Indians collecting or selling it. On 5th April he reached the sea and made salt, breaking British law. On 4th May he was arrested and imprisoned.

Thousands of Indians followed Gandhi from his religious retreat near Ahmedabad to the Arabian Sea coast, a distance of about 240 miles. The march resulted in the arrest of nearly 60,000 people, including Gandhi himself.

Gandhi said his resistance to British salt policies would be the unifying theme for his campaign of 'satyagraha', or mass civil disobedience. The word means 'truth with insistence' in Sanskrit.

During the salt march – which Gandhi described as a 'padyatra' (a long spiritual march) – he made many speeches on the

injustices of the Indian caste system, which labelled the lowest classes 'untouchable'.

17 days after Gandhi's arrest, the poet Sarojini Naidu led 2,500 marchers on the Dharasana Salt Works, north of Bombay. They were beaten viciously by police, which prompted an international outcry. India was granted its independence in 1947. Gandhi was assassinated the following year, in January 1948, by a Hindu nationalist.



Women's World Day of Prayer

Women, men and children of all ages are called to 'Rise, take your mat and walk' to join this day of prayer. Women of Zimbabwe have prepared this year's service and they encourage us all to reflect on the difficulties

and unrest that have plagued their country for many years. They share the challenges they have met and the hopes they have for the future. They encourage us to 'Rise, take your mat and walk' with them as they continue their often turbulent journey towards full reconciliation.

Women's World Day of Prayer is an international inter-church organisation which enables us to hear the thoughts of women from all parts of the world: their hopes, concerns and prayers. The preparation for the day is a vast undertaking, with regional conferences held around the world to consider and plan each year's service.

Zimbabwe has a population of 16 million people, of which 50% are children (younger than 16). 80% of the population are Christian and the main economic activities are mining (precious metals, clay, diamonds) and agriculture (corn, coffee, cotton, tobacco, sugar cane).

The day of prayer is celebrated in over 170 countries. It begins in Samoa and the prayer day in native languages travels around the world, through Asia, Africa, the Middle East, Europe and the Americas before finishing in American Somoa more than 36 hours later.


Multi-sport Youth Club at St Peter's church

A multi-sport youth club, organised and funded by Stanley Residents group and delivered by Total Sporting Solutions (TSS) Ltd will be starting on Friday 6th March at St Peter's church.

Stanley Residents group obtained the funding to put on a youth club for young people in Stanley nearly 2 years ago, with the plan to run the club at the Cross Keys Youth centre. However, due to the poor condition of the Cross Keys building, it wasn't able to get started.
