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Dear Friends,

I wonder how many of our readers remember the closing moments of the world cup final in 1966 when Kenneth Wolstenholme who was commenting for BBC TV uttered the immortal words: "they think it is all over....we'll it is now" as Geoff Hurst scored England's fourth goal to beat the mighty West Germany. A few seconds later England won the world cup four goals to two, Bobby Moore lifted the trophy, the country celebrated, and the rest is history, so to speak.

Well, as autumn begins to take hold and the nights draw in, there's one thing we can say about the COVID pandemic, and that is as much as we would like it to be, it is far from over. In the past few weeks we are witnessing a rising number of positive cases and sadly more deaths as a result of this devastating and terrible virus. We are into the second wave of the pandemic and as we navigate as a country through various local lockdown measures the situation appears more complicated than in March. In Jesus' day the yoke was a wooden collar that ran across the shoulders of a pair of oxen and enabled them to jointly pull enormous weights. Jesus invites each one of us to be yoked with him in love so that he will gladly share our lives and offer us comfort and support in our present situation.

As we move deeper into autumn, why not think about inviting Jesus to share your burdens and weariness – you may be pleasantly surprised to experience his love and presence in the most unexpected places and times.


Coffee Morning: There is a coffee morning every Thursday morning, 10am-12 noon. Come and relax with friends over a cuppa.

RSPCA launches emergency appeal in wake of Covid

The RSPCA has been overwhelmed this year by calls for help from people. They received 442,344 calls, and responded to 106,676 incidents between March and August, averaging 790 incidents a day.

It was a challenge to meet this volume of need, especially given that the charity was working with fewer officers, due to furlough, shielding and ill health. A spokesman said "As well as operating an emergency service, rescuing animals in need, RSPCA officers have also been collecting animals from the homes of people who have been admitted to hospital with Covid-19, who may not have anyone else to care for them while their owners are being treated."

Mount Road Methodist Chapel news

Precautions are being taken to keep everyone safe; come along and give it a try!





St Peter's Harvest Festival Service

Despite the ongoing restrictions, St Peter's church will be holding its Harvest Festival service on **Sunday 11th October at 10am**. It will look different to previous years, as we won't be able to have as many people in the congregation, and we

are still not permitted to sing. Even so it is an opportunity to thank God for his gifts to us all, and our many blessings.

We are unable to hold our community harvest lunch this year, because of the social distancing guidelines. However, any fresh food that is donated will be used by our senior citizens' Tuesday lunch club, and any remaining tinned or dried food will be donated to either CAP Care in Wakefield which provides meals to the homeless, or St Catherine's church food bank.

We will be serving refreshments after the service; people will be served where they are sat, rather than having to go up to the kitchen counter.

The Annual Parochial Church Meeting (APCM)

Straight after the harvest service on Sunday 11th October, we will be holding our APCM, more commonly known as an Annual General Meeting (AGM). The AGM was originally scheduled to take place back in April, but had to be delayed because of the coronavirus pandemic.

This meeting will review what happened in 2019, which seems rather a long time ago now! The church finances from 2019 will be presented, and members will be elected to the Parochial church council (PCC) and officers elected. There will also be a discussion about our plans and hopes for the future. If you want to learn more about the church's ministry, where the money comes from and how it's spent, and what the various church officers do, then come along and find out!

The next AGM (to discuss the events and finances of 2020) will be taking place in only 6 months time, in March or April 2021, assuming that the world will have returned to a bit more normality by then! No doubt we will reviewing how the coronavirus pandemic has affected us at St Peter's church.

Grant success for St Peter's church

Over the past couple of months, St Peter's church has been awarded two generous grants in recognition of our involvement in our local community. The grants are from the National Lottery Coronavirus Community Support Fund and from The National Emergencies Trust

(NET) Coronavirus appeal, distributed by Leeds Community Foundation. It has been a very difficult year for small charities such as ours; at St Peter's church we have has been affected by the loss of room hire income, the cancellation of fundraising events and fewer church services.



However, our costs are largely fixed and therefore do not change even if our income falls. Therefore these grants will help us cover our essential costs over the next few months while we are still unable to run the building and our activities at full capacity.



We have also received smaller funds from Wakefield Council and the Moorhouse community action group to cover the costs incurred during the 20 weeks of the hot meals programme that we delivered from March—July in the height of lockdown. We were also given a number of donations from members of the public for the hot meals, which was extraordinarily generous and thoughtful.

The government and charitable organisations have given millions of pounds to small charities to see them through the current difficulties and we are extremely grateful that we have been able to secure a portion of the grants; this will help us cover our costs and keep our building and activities available to our community of Stanley.

Why singing in church is the same as shouting at the pub

How dangerous is it to sing in church or in a choir, when it comes to spreading coronavirus? Apparently, it's about the same as it is to speak loudly in a pub. So say researchers at the University of Bristol. They have found that speaking loudly and singing generate about the same amounts of aerosol droplet – tiny particles of liquid – which are thought to carry Covid-19. The louder you sing or speak, the more the number of aerosol droplets.

Moral questions from the pandemic

You may have missed it at the time. The movie 'Contagion', (starring Kate Winslet, Gwyneth Paltrow, Jude Law, Matt Damon and Marion Cotillard) didn't make much of an impact when it was released for public viewing in 2011. Perhaps it was thought to be unrealistic. It was about a highly contagious, unknown virus, transmitted by an infected bat to a pig in a Chinese marketplace. From there it spread like wildfire round the world.

It was fiction then of course, but not so far-fetched as to be distant from reality, as we now know. Deadly viruses, and the plagues they cause, have been part of world history since time began. In the early days, when travel between continents was infrequent, their spread was slower and usually confined to local regions.

The way the film's imaginary plot develops bears an uncanny resemblance to what we have experienced this year. Panic buying empties supermarkets, whole populations adopt social distancing, scientists work flat out to identify the virus and then search for a means to combat it. Meanwhile, millions are infected, and quarantines are imposed.

The story progresses far beyond the reality which we have experienced. The irresponsible use of social media and false rumours of a cure lead to the looting of pharmacies. Emergency food supplies are ransacked; law and order break down; troops police the streets. Then, a breakthrough: a vaccine is discovered. But that raises a new moral problem: who will get it first and how to distribute it fairly?

The movie is still available via Netflix, or you can buy a DVD online. Despite the inevitable carnage of the pandemic and the suffering it portrays, it contrives to have a relatively happy ending.

In real life, we haven't got that far yet. But, please God, we will. After all, most deadly diseases are now under control and both vaccination and immunisation are part and parcel of everyday life; the older among us take it for granted that their GP will summon them for an anti-flu jab each winter.

But we may face an ethical dilemma when it comes to a vaccine for Covid-19. If there's an initial shortage, who should get it first? Should money come into it? Are Christian principles applicable? How should it be distributed to poorer countries around the world?

In Jesus.



The charities working in Beirut

On 4 August 2020, a vast quantity of ammonium nitrate stored in a warehouse in Beirut, the capital of Lebanon, exploded. The explosion measured 3.3 on the Richter scale, caused at least 200 deaths, 6,500 injuries, US\$15 billion in property damage, and left an estimated 300,000 people homeless. Since then, many charities have been working around the clock to respond to the emergency, providing survival kits, food, shelter, hygiene products, education support, counselling, and much more.

Tearfund has been working in Lebanon since 2013, supporting the 1.5 million refugees that fled the war in Syria. Since the explosion, Tearfund has been working with its local partners to distribute thousands of hot meals, food vouchers, and to help churches and other faith organisations that are providing emergency shelter. The Barnabas Fund charity has sent more than £85,000 to help Christians in Beirut with food and the repair of their homes. Four of the five neighbourhoods worst affected are predominantly Christian. Many of those needing help were already very poor and vulnerable. Another charity on the ground in Beirut is Unicef, and St Peter's church has sent £700 to help Unicef provide emergency help to children affected by the blast.
