#### **Proposed Community Memorial Garden**

Plans are under way for the design and development of St Peter's Community Memorial Garden within the grounds of the old church-yard. The Memorial Garden is intended to mark the history of the church and the community of Stanley; not just the site of the old church building, but also the community that it served. This is particularly poignant in this time of the pandemic.

A team of residents have been meeting to outline ideas, and have commissioned a landscape architect to develop these ideas. In due course, the proposals will be presented to the community via the church website, Stanley Residents Group (SRG) and church Facebook pages etc, and will be on display in the church centre, when we are able to meet and move around more freely.

Leeds Diocese have also been consulted, and agree with the aim of creating an area of peace and tranquillity; an open space where people can walk or sit and enjoy the space and views over the valley. The garden will have hard landscaping features, areas for seating, shrubs, flowers and tree planting (in line with the SRG's aim to identify areas for tree planting around the village—see opposite).

We hope that the community will support the memorial garden. There will be the chance to contribute to the cost of the garden as we progress, but we can already report that:

- £450 has already been secured from a grant application for planting around the Miners Wheel. Thanks to Nicola Sinclair from SRG for her hard work in submitting the application.
- Daffodil bulbs, sponsored by the church, SRG and individuals, have been planted on the embankment overlooking Aberford Road.
- St Peter's Church are sponsoring the landscape architect's fees.

The proposed new trees will be will be heavy duty standards, and people/organisations will be invited to sponsor a tree in memory of someone or something. There will be more information about supporting the memorial garden project in the not too distant future!

It is hoped that as we look to the future, we can reflect on our past and our present and know that we, the community of Stanley, have marked the history of Stanley in a manner which can be appreciated by generations to come.

#### It's all about the Trees....

Firstly, we must say a massive thank you to those who sponsored the **Lamppost Christmas Trees** this year. We only had 6 but they seemed to be a huge success; so much so that we already have over 16 people interested in sponsoring one later this

Also, we have an exciting new project for 2021 and beyond to plant trees for Stanley.

In recent years, a vast amount of land has been cleared to make way for houses, business, new roads etc. in our area, and as a consequence, we have lost many trees and hedgerows. At the same time, our village has seen an increase in the number of vehicles owned by residents as well as an increase in through-traffic.

These two things have a big impact on the air that we are all breathing, and we wanted to start to address the imbalance. As we all know, trees are the lungs of our planet; they soak up all the pollution in the atmosphere and filter it for us into cleaner air.

So....we are busy identifying any community spaces which might be suitable to plant new trees to improve our village for generations to come. We are getting involved with the Woodland Trust, Plant Britain and other organisations to help us with this project, and all the trees that are planted will be mapped and included in the White Rose Forest which in turn, is part of the Northern Forest national initiative. And of course, we will be working closely with Wakefield Council who have ambitious climate change targets to achieve by 2030.

We would love your help in suggesting any places that you think may be suitable for tree planting. Not all areas will be suitable of course, and the council will help us to decide which areas are best, and will ensure that all planting is done responsibly without detriment to property, utilities etc.

#### Supporting charities at home and abroad

Every year, St Peter's church makes a commitment to support a number of charitable causes. Despite the enormous difficulties of 2020, the church, with the support of its congregation and community groups, donated around £4,000 to the following charitable causes:



- £700 was given to the UNICEF Beirut appeal to help with the enormous task of supporting families and children affected by the catastrophic explosion in Beirut in August 2020 which killed at least 204 and left 300,000 people homeless and in James people homeless and in desperate need.
- £700 was also sent to the Mara Safe House, a hostel in Tanzania for young women threatened with female genital mutilation (FGM). The hostel gives them food, shelter, education and protection, and also engages with family reconciliation and community awareness.
- The church has given a total of £1,200 during the year to The Cross Project, which runs lunch clubs, religious education lessons and after-school activities in local secondary schools.
- £500 was given to CAP Care Wakefield to help with the meals and support they offer to the homeless in Wakefield. During 2020, CAP Care served 18,589 meals to 808 people at their centre on Market Street in Wakefield.



- £500 was given to Wakefield Hospice; recognising that many local charities have been badly affected by the restrictions to their usual fundraising activities.
- £200 was given in January 2020 to the South Yorkshire Community Foundation to help communities affected by the floods a year ago.
- Despite the restrictions to our Sunday morning services this year, several dozen people donated wrapped Christmas presents which were donated to Barnados to distribute amongst children and young people in the UK.
- Again, our Christingle service wasn't the same as in previous years, but we added to the donations received and \(\gamma\) gave £250 to the Children's Society which supports children in need the UK.



#### Ash Wednesday: experiencing the Passover in Jerusalem

Ash Wednesday, which this year falls on 17th February, marks the beginning of Lent, the Christian preparation for Easter. The final week of Lent, known as Holy Week, normally coincides with Passover, the major Jewish celebration of the year. It's near Easter because Jesus was crucified at Passover, having just shared this very meal with His disciples.

Passover celebrates and recalls the Israelites' escape from slavery in Egypt. Led by Moses they crossed the Red Sea and 40 days later entered the 'Promised Land.' They shared the Passover meal at their last night in Egypt and have kept it all for nearly the past three thousand years or so that have followed.

Many years ago, when I was in Jerusalem to produce a radio programme, I was invited to join a Jewish family for their Passover meal. It was a great occasion, very like our Christmas, a family event with deep religious significance for those who seek it.

At the meal in Jerusalem, we ate modest lentils and unleavened bread – Matzos as we now call it. We also drank plenty of wine but not from the cup at the end of the table. That is 'Elijah's cup', only to be drunk from when the prophet comes to announce the arrival of the Messiah. At the last supper Jesus instructed His disciples to drink from that cup after supper, which may have shocked them at the time. The Messiah had come!

As we begin the time of Lent and our preparation for Easter, please join us on our church Facebook page for our online Ash Wednesday service at 7.30pm on Wednesday 17th February.

Right from the early Christian church, it was customary for people to have ashes sprinkled over them at the beginning of Lent, as a symbol of penitence. The custom of 'ashing' was abolished at the

Reformation, although the old name for the day remains. Nowadays, throughout the Church of England, receiving the mark of ashes on one's forehead is optional. It is also customary to burn the left-over palm cross from the previous year's Palm Sunday to create the ashes for today.

#### Delivering hot meals to people in Stanley

During the first lockdown (it seems a long time ago now!) St Peter's church cooked and delivered nearly 400 hot meals to elderly and isolating people in Stanley, from March-July 2020. Some of the people receiving the meals were regulars from the well-established

Tuesday senior citizens' lunch club. But others had contacted the Stanley volunteer group or Wakefield Council and said that they were in need of some help.

Since the new year, the church is again delivering hot meals every Tuesday, to around 22 people each week. Some are elderly, but we are also delivering to a couple of families.

The hot meal deliveries would not be possible without the ongoing support of Alternative Care who run the café in conjunction with St Peter's church. Huge thanks to our chef, Andrea! We are also very grateful for the financial support we have received from Wakefield Council, Moorhourse Community Action Group, and several private individuals who have been very generous.

Ma B's café have also been delivering hot meals, often for no fee, throughout the pandemic, to a number of individuals. It is really heart warming that there are so many people in our community eager to help and support each other through such a difficult time.

#### Follow a new pilgrim path

In the south of England, a new pilgrim path is emerging. Winding through downland, weald and shoreline for 250 miles, the Old Way from Southampton to Canterbury is derived from the oldest road map of Britain: the Gough Map, c.1360.

Like the Santiago de Compostela in Spain, this ancient route has lain dormant for years. But it has been recently rediscovered by the British Pilgrimage Trust, who have used the Gough Map to create a new pilgrimage route with ancient roots, visiting places like Arundel, Southampton, Chichester, Battle, Rye etc.

In unison with the Old Way's development, the British Pilgrimage Trust are also reintroducing another ancient, and similarly dormant, tradition. The offering of 'sanctuary' hospitality to pilgrims along a pilgrimage route was common practise, up until the English Reformation of 1534. Monasteries throughout the country would reserve a room or building specifically for travellers who would rely on these sanctuaries in order to make pilgrimage. When pilgrimage was banned in 1538 and monasteries demolished, these two practices—making pilgrimage and providing sanctuary—ceased, lying fallow for hundreds of years.

It is natural, then, that with the re-emergence of pilgrimage in the UK, the provision of sanctuary should likewise become common practice again. The BPT has worked with 13 churches along the Old Way, who will offer overnight sanctuary to BPT pilgrims walking the route, in exchange for a donation (between £5-£10 per pilgrim for one night) to their church. In Spring 2021, Covid-19 permitting, the Sanctuary Project will launch.

The BPT is looking for more churches, based along this route and in other locations across Britain, to take up this project. This is a fantastic opportunity: not only will the project enable pilgrims on lower incomes to make pilgrimage, but it will also bring a new type of visitor and donation to churches.

The birds and bees: Here is some good news: all new major roads will have wildflower-friendly verges that could boost our numbers of birds and bees. Highway England has said that vibrant road verges will be created as standard on new roads over 300 miles in England, using low nutrient soils which will be seeded with wildflowers or left to grow naturally. A staggering 97% of our meadows have been destroyed since


the Thirties, due to modern agriculture. This means that the 238,000 hectares of road verges across the UK could become a vital habitat for pollinators. The Government has pledged to build 4,000 miles of new road by 2025.



**Smart bird:** Ravens have been found to be among the cleverest animals in the world. These large members of the crow family can even score as high on intelligence tests as chimpanzees. Ravens can remember where food is hidden, can use tools to get at it, follow human faces



with their eyes, and understand what people mean when they point. All in all, researchers praise their "general, sophisticated cognitive skills." The study was carried out at Osnabruck University in Germany.
