

#### Mount Road Chapel—another victim of the pandemic?

In 2018 we had various meetings to discuss the future of the Church and agreed to try and grow as a Church, increase our membership and make our building a more welcoming place for everyone. Since then, our membership numbers have fallen, the building still needs a lot of work to keep it going and our finances are decreasing. At our council meeting on 17th October we discussed what the future could be and talked about the procedure of closing a Church. At our next meeting in March 2022 we must decide on our future.

As a Result the Trustees have decided to have a "Last Roll of the Dice" by having a <u>Pre-Christmas Event at Mount Road Chapel on 20th November between 12pm—3pm</u>. We plan to do hot pork rolls and a selection of sandwiches, cakes, and drinks, plus a small selection of stalls and a tombola. The intention is to raise funds towards the church, promote regular services and forthcoming events over Christmas and explore with visitors if there is a future for Christian Methodist worship at Mount Road Chapel before commencing the procedure to close the premises.

The loss of Mount Road Chapel will extend the area where Methodist worship is unavailable. If it closes, it will join the list of historic chapel closures in the Stanley area; namely: Bottom Boat, Lane Ends, Ferry Lane, Canal Lane and Bolus Lane. The nearest Chapels will then be Trinity at Eastmoor, Lofthouse Hill, Parkside Outwood, Altofts, or Wrenthorpe.

The Chapel has been self-sufficient depending purely on the support of its members' efforts and has helped many charities financially as well as offering a home for many local organisations.

This is not a 'bleeding heart' appeal but simply a statement of fact that the village is regretfully about to lose another facility and premise for worship if it is not used.

#### An evacuee to Stanley, 1944-1945 continued....

Here is the conclusion of last month's article written by Ken Hale, who was evacuated from London to Stanley and lived with the Nicholson family on Lake Lock Road. He had just discovered that his father, a navigator in the RAAF, was killed in a mission to Sicily, alongside a Henry Balmforth, who just so happened to be from Stanley.....

A few weeks ago when I was looking at the Ancestry site I had set up for the flight crew to which Henry Balmforth and my father belonged, I suddenly realised that Henry Balmforth's mother's maiden name was Nicholson. I knew that the family that had taken my mother and me in as evacuees were a Mr & Mrs Nicholson, and I knew their address where we had stayed.

I wondered whether, as Stanley was not that large, there might be a family link between Henry Balmforth's mother and my 'auntie and uncle'. So I used Ancestry to try and locate any family connections, and I was amazed to find that there was a link!

Henry Balmforth's mother's maiden name was Ivy Nicholson. I found that she was one of 5 siblings and one of her brothers was Norman Nicholson. Norman Nicholson married Dorothy May Bagnall. Norman and May Nicholson were living at 124 Lake Lock Road, Stanley in 1937 and 1949 according to electoral registers for those years. 124 Lake Lock Road Stanley is the same address that my mother and I lived at whilst evacuated to Yorkshire in 1943/44 - 1945, and where we, the Hale family, had visited several times after the war.

So, amazingly, my mother and I had been looked after as evacuees by an auntie and uncle of Henry Balmforth who had died alongside my father!

As far as I am able to ascertain there is no previous link between the Hale and Nicholson families. At the moment the two families first met they were complete strangers unknown to each other. We (the Hale family) had never visited Stanley in Yorkshire before, and as far as I am aware no Nicholson had visited London before. It was just a coincidence that Mr & Mrs Nicholson looked after my mother and me as evacuees.

Certainly neither my mother, nor anybody else had or has to my mind or recollection ever mentioned anything relating to this coincidence, even though we spent many holidays after the war in Stanley with the family that had looked after us.

It is so sad that now so many of the involved persons are no longer with us and therefore are not aware of the facts.

If there are any relatives of the Nicholson family, or anyone else, who may have something to add to my memory or even clarify the information I have found and they would like to let me know, I would appreciate receiving the information. #### **Doctor Livingstone, I presume?**

It was 150 years ago, on 10th November 1871, that Welsh journalist and explorer Henry Morton Stanley located the missing missionary Dr David Livingstone near Lake Tanganyika, in present-day Tanzania. He allegedly greeted him with the words: "Doctor Livingstone, I presume?"

Stanley's real name was John Rowlands. He was born in Denbigh and was abandoned by his unmarried 18-year-old mother and ended up in a workhouse until he was 15. He then went to America, changed his name, and became an American citizen. When he found Livingstone, he was working for the New York Herald.

Known for his strength of will, Stanley also had an African name – Bula Matari – Breaker of Rocks. Much of his life was spent in Central Africa, and his reputation was mixed: he was said by some to be violent

toward Africans, but by others to have treated them well. His feats as an explorer were impressive: he played a big part in locating the true source of both the Nile and the Congo, and he helped open up the Congo on behalf of King Leopold of Belgium. Though not overtly religious, he felt he was engaged in a 'sacred task'. In 1892, following his marriage, he again became a British subject.

#### In memory of a great Russian novelist

200 years ago this month, on 11th November 1821, Fyodor Dostoevsky, the Russian novelist, short story writer and journalist was born. He is best known for his novel 'Crime and Punishment', and he is rated as one of the greatest novelists in all of world literature.

His mother used the Bible to teach him to read and write at the age of four, and this – together with a nanny who read him fairy tales from an even earlier age – led him to a lifelong devotion to literature.

He was brought up as an Orthodox Christian and maintained his belief throughout his life, though he had doubts about certain Church practices – especially those of the Catholic Church and Pope Pius IX. But he viewed Christ with great love.

He narrowly escaped death in his mid-twenties when he became involved with a group that criticised the Tsar. He was condemned to death but reprieved and sentenced to hard labour in Siberia. This aggravated his epilepsy, which led to his death many years later. On his deathbed he requested that the Parable of the Prodigal Son be read to his children.

#### **Our affection for Premium Bonds**

Premium Bonds first went on sale 65 years ago, on 5th November 1956. The aim was to persuade people to save, following the end of WWII, and on the first day £5 million

worth of Bonds were bought (equivalent to £120 million today). The machine that generated the winning numbers was called the Electronic Random Number Indicator Equipment, or 'Ernie' for short.

There is no guarantee that you will ever win, although you can also never lose your stake. The odds against each £1 Bond winning a prize are 34,500 to 1. Nevertheless Premium Bonds are said to be held by more than 22 million people, or about 1 in 3 of the UK population.
